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FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

One of the great hallmarks celebrated during the month of February beyond that of love and Valentine's Day, is Ground Hog Day on February 2, and the predictions that are made that accompany the national tradition and the official celebration of the appearance of Punxsutawney Phil. You will recall that if he sees his shadow due to clear weather he will retreat to his den and winter will persist for another six weeks; if it does not see its shadow because of cloudiness, spring will arrive early. While the tradition remains popular, studies have found no consistent correlation between a groundhog seeing its shadow and the subsequent arrival of spring-like weather.

Where am I going with this you ask? Well, first of all, predicting whether the ground hog sees a shadow or when winter turns to spring often seems irrelevant when living in the Sunshine State, and secondly, I would like to focus on this idea of predictions. Recently I had people ask me if I have any predictions for our church and ministry in the coming months and years? It is an interesting thought to say the least and one that I am sure many people are asking themselves during our transition period. Unfortunately, when I first accepted the Call to serve as your Associate Pastor, I had no predictions as to where God would lead me and the ministry that would develop here. Who would have ever predicted the COVID Pandemic, the Harbor Chase Campus, our Trinity Online Campus, the Bushnell Campus, the reduction of our debts, and more? No one could - except God - and His infamous wisdom confirming His infinite purpose through the leading of His Holy Spirit to the place where we are today!

Intentional Interim Minister

In mid-December we received from District, a list of 5 names with information of Intentional Interim Ministers as candidates to be considered for our IIM position. As directed by District to have 5 leaders of Trinity congregation to evaluate and interview these candidates, the IIM Team of Gilbert Dahnke (President), Carolyn Fortin (Vice President), Chuck Wilt (Head Elder), Joan Egeland (Secretary), Dennis Esch (Stewardship Chair) began meeting to evaluate all candidates.

The 5 candidates are Reverend David Boyd, Staunton VA., Reverend Gary Boye, Tempe AZ., Reverend James Kirschenmann, Mundelein IL., Reverend Roger Schoolcraft, Fayetteville AR., Reverend Dale Skurla, Prescott AZ.

We contacted candidates to inquire as to their availability and desire to temporarily relocate to Florida, serving as our IIM during our transition and call process.

Pastor Roger Schoolcraft became our candidate of choice with his experience, recommendation from his District President and information he provided to us.

He has served as Pastor to churches in Missouri, Iowa, Nebraska and Arkansas and served as an IIM Pastor to churches in Maryland, North Carolina and Virginia.

Our IIM Team invited him for a personal visit to Trinity to meet with our leadership, see our campus facilities and tour the surrounding areas. That meeting did occur on Tuesday January 18 and Wednesday January 19. During the visit he met with Pastor Blair, the IIM Team, Staff, Church Council and Elders. Our time together was very well received and positive by our Leadership and also by Pastor Schoolcraft.

After the visit, the IIM Team recommended to the Church Council that Trinity extend a call to Pastor Schoolcraft to serve as our IIM, and the Church Council recommends to the Congregation to accept this recommendation and issue a call to Pastor Roger Schoolcraft.

We will have a Special Called Congregation Voter Meeting on February 13, 2022 at 9:15 a.m. in the Sanctuary between Sunday Services.



During the meeting we will present 2 items for a Congregation vote. One for issuing the IIM Call to Pastor Roger Schoolcraft.

The other for the Congregation to vote on Trinity's Delegates to the Florida-Georgia District convention in June 2022. Dennis Esch (Stewardship Chair) has volunteered to be the Lay Delegate for Trinity and Gilbert Dahnke has volunteered as the alternate should Dennis be unable to attend. Pastor Blair will be the Pastoral Delegate.

According to District Guidelines, these Delegates must be approved at a congregation voter meeting.

A very important decision and vote at the District convention this year is for the District President position. Current President, Rev. Dr. Gregory Walton is term limited and will not be able to continue in that position. - Gil Dahnke, President

The initial transition team meeting on January 14, 2021 was opened with a very informative Zoom meeting and briefing provided by Pastor Greg Walton, President LCMS FL/GA district. He explained the importance of the various processes through transition and call for a new Pastor.

Once again, he emphasized the need for <u>patience</u>, that this is a marathon and not a sprint. It is very important to do a self-study and evaluate our Mission, Vision and Long-range plans for Trinity. Two work groups within the team have been formed to begin the tasks at hand. We have two members leading the teams; Joyce Mussey is leading the Mission, Vision and Long-Range Plan working group; and Bill Schwieger is leading the demographics and accountability working group.

COMMITTEE ON GLOBAL MISSIONS BOARD OF EVANGELISM

The Trinity Lutheran Church committee on Global Missions works to inspire our fellow Christians to spread the Gospel throughout the world by any and all God pleasing methods.

Next month, Trinity Lutheran Church will join churches around the world recognizing World Day of Prayer. It is celebrated on the first Friday in March, March 4, 2022. We hope you will put this date on your calendar and set aside some time to pray.

"And in all things, whatsoever you shall ask for in prayer, believing you shall receive." - Matthew 21:22

WORLD DAY OF PRAYER

The origins of World Day of Prayer date back to the 19th century when Christian women of the United States and Canada initiated a variety of cooperative activities in support of women's involvement in mission at home and in other parts of the world.

Women had a strong sense of identification with the needs of women and children and searched for ways to provide support. Despite strong resistance from all-male mission boards, beginning in 1861 women founded many women's boards for foreign and home missions where they could work directly with other women and children.

Women were encouraged to engage in personal prayer and take leadership within their mission auxiliaries and associations. This emphasis on prayer led to annual days and weeks of prayer. In 1887 Presbyterian women called for a day of prayer for home missions and Methodist women called for a week of prayer and self-denial for foreign missions. A Baptist day of prayer for foreign missions began in 1891.

Women had a vision of Christian unity that was essential to their exercise of mission. By 1897 six denominations had formed a committee for a united day of prayer for home missions. In 1911 women celebrated the 50th anniversary of women's missionary activity by organizing a series of speaking engagements across the US providing other women with a powerful experience of ecumenical cooperation and fellowship. Women of the six participating denominations wrote a common worship service on a rotating basis and in 1912 called for a united day of prayer for foreign missions.

After the devastation of World War I, women incorporated the conviction that world peace was intrinsically tied to world mission and renewed their efforts for unity. The first Friday of Lent was established as a joint day of prayer for missions and celebrated for the first time on February 20, 1920. Due to the enthusiasm of denominational and interdenominational women's groups, world spread rapidly throughout the USA. In 1922, Canadian women who had begun celebrating a day of prayer in 1895 took up the same date.

In 1926 women in North America distributed the worship service to as many countries and partners in mission as they could. The worldwide response was enthusiastic. By 1927 the call to prayer was issued for a World Day of Prayer for Missions. The title was shortened to World Day of Prayer in 1928 and that same year; this statement came from the World Day of Prayer Committee:

It is with deep gratitude that we recognize the growing power inherent in our World Day of Prayer. A very decided expansion of this prayer fellowship has come during the past year. The circle of prayer has expanded literally around the world. We have learned the great lesson of praying with, rather than for, our sisters of other races and nations, thus enriching our experience and releasing the power which must be ours if we are to accomplish tasks entrusted to us.



G.G.'s House: 74 soapy washcloths, 11 blankets, 4 floor pillows

SOZO kids: 6 children's quilts Esther House: 5 ladies quilts

Leesburg Nursing homes (Christmas gifts for the forgotten/lonely seniors):

16 quilts

9 walker bags

Esther house is a halfway house for women who are adjusting to coming back into society after spending time in prison. They are given guidance and care as they make this adjustment. They take five women at a time. The quilts are going to be given to Esther house at the January meeting of LWML.

We have finished our work on assembling blankets to help keep the poverty stricken living in the Ocala National Forest warm during the cold nights. We still have many in the last stages of tying the layers together with embroidery floss. We hope to get these finished and delivered soon.

Our next focus is assembling the balance of the patriotic quilts in preparation for the April Honor flight. We have about 1/2 of the 65 needed ready to be given out. We have enough quilt tops sewn to complete what we need and just need to assemble the layers and get them tied.

By the time, you get this newsletter we should be done with the honor flight quilts and will be turning our focus on getting quilts and other items read to distribute to baby and children's charities and replenish our supply of adult quilts for memorials, etc.

We have an ongoing need for the following items:

- \Rightarrow wash cloths
- \Rightarrow soap (any size bar)
- ⇒ Stuffing for floor pillows (can be taken from old throw or bed pillows, scrap fabric or batting)
- ⇒ Sheets (flat or fitted, we even take stained which we use for middle layers for camp blankets)
- ⇒ macramé cord to use for drawstrings

Donations of the above items can be dropped off at the church office or placed in the donation box in Room 4 in the back of the church.

We could also use more help! No skill needed. We have many very simple tasks we can teach you how to do. We meet every Friday from Noon until 3 PM in Room 1

If you know of someone who is suffering physically or emotionally and would be blessed by a comfort of a quilt, we have a supply in the closet under the stairs. When you take one, please register it in the notebook on the shelf with the quilts.

No Easy Answers: Part 14

"Finally, brothers and sisters, rejoice! Strive for full restoration, encourage one another, be of one mind, live in peace. And the God of love and peace will be with you." (2 Corinthians 13:11)

In the third chapter of Ecclesiastes we read: "There is a time for everything, and a season for every activity under the heavens: a time to kill and a time to heal, a time to tear down and a time to build, a time to weep and a time to laugh, a time to mourn and a time to dance, a time to keep and a time to throw away, a time to tear and a time to mend, a time to be silent and a time to speak, a time to love and a time to hate, a time for war and a time for peace." And I might add, I swear it is not too late.

Paul writes in in Second Corinthians that we are to encourage one another, live in peace and be of one mind. Again, in First Thessalonians, Paul tells us that we are to encourage one another with words. So, what does it mean to encourage one another? In this case, it would mean, "to make (someone) more determined, hopeful, or confident." Maybe that is why Paul wrote in Colossians that our conversations should always of full of grace and seasoned with salt. Paul also writes in Ephesians that we should do this for the building up of the body.

Other definitions and words that could be used for encouraged are inspired, hearten, and embolden. Inspired implies instilling life, energy, courage, or vigor into something. Hearten implies the lifting of dispiritedness or despondency by infusing of fresh zeal or courage. Embolden implies giving the gift of courage to overcome timidity or reluctance. All of which mean to fill or strengthen with purpose.

I am reminded of a television commercial that went something like this. I wife tries on a new dress and she then asked her husband if the dress made her look fat. Trying to be diplomatic the husband says, "It is not the dress." Well, we all know where that husband was sleeping that night, with Rover. I'm sure that husband's intention was well meaning and not specifically designed to be hurtful. But, I am sure the words cut her to the core. I'm not too sure what the husband could have said, this I do know, silence at the right time is golden. Or just maybe, he could have said, "what do you think?"

Sometimes we are like the husband, we do not mean any harm or disrespect, but the words just slip out. Over my forty years as a priest, I have had to learn what is acceptable speech and what is not. I have had to learn when it is time to be silent and when it is time to speak. Sometimes the lessons have been hard and sometimes they have been easy. Sometimes I have spoken out of turn without having all the relevant information. Sometimes I should have remained silent and just walked away. And I thank those who have mentored me over the years, and those who are still teaching me.

C. Roy Angell in his book, <u>Baskets of Silver</u> reminds us of a custom that was followed in the time of Solomon. At a royal banquet, a silver basket would be placed on each table as a centerpiece. The basket was filled with apples made of gold. At some time during the meal, the basket was passed, and every guest was invited to select one of the gleaming golden apples as a gift from the king.

Proverbs twenty-five tells us; "A word properly spoken is like apples of gold in a basket of silver." I like what Solomon says, that a proper word is not like an apple but apples of gold.

We who live centuries after Solomon have come to adopt an understanding that words do not really matter that much. That we have the right to use and arrange our words so that they carry thoughts and meanings without regard for another's feelings. I wonder why that is? Is it because we have freedom of speech? Is it because we have lost touch with what hurtful and slanderous words can do to a person's ego? Do they make us feel better about ourselves?

I am especially concerned about the way congregations use their words today. For example, I overheard two ladies talking about their preacher. One comment I remember, oh so well, was "He thinks he owns the church." The other lady agreed and put in her two cents. Then there was the time the pastor had retired and left the church. It seemed that everything that when wrong after he left was laid at his feet. Did they really need a fall guy that badly? I guess so. One of my all-time favorites was spoken by a church leader when he said about the current pastor; "he is holding us hostage." Really! Will someone please explain to me how a pastor can hold a congregation hostage? To me, it is the other way around.

Joyce Landorf calls people who only know how to criticize or demean people as "irregular people." She further states that it is not their intention to hurt or insult. They do not know how to love, not even themselves, and worst of all, they do not know how to be loved. (That is the real tragedy.) They just do not know any better. It is their way of elevating themselves by trying to bring others down to their level. Which by the way, works only if the other person has very low self-esteem. So, why do people act this way? Here again I do not know. But my guess is, it is easier to criticize than to give someone a complement and a word of encouragement. Think for a minute, you would cross a busy intersection just to speak to someone who has given you a complement. And rightfully so. But you would walk around the block just to avoid a face-to-face confrontation with someone who has criticized you.

I have searched the Bible, and nowhere do I find the command to downgrade another. Nowhere. I find it disappointing that the language of church-going individuals could be so harsh. Ah, maybe that is the problem. They are church goers. But what about Christians who are there every time the church doors are open. Do we ever hear a negative word coming from their lips? Do we always hear the truth and nothing but the truth? No. Do leaders in Christian churches ever try to spin their words so that something sounds better than it is? Do they ever try to place the blame on someone else? The unfortunate answer to those questions is, "yes". And here again I must ask, "why?"

It is my hope and prayer that during this time of transition, we as a congregation will hear nothing but the truth and no spin. That the words that proceed from all our lips will be pleasing to our Father and to one another. It is not necessary that we always think alike, but it is mandatory that we respect each other. We always need to remember that if I disagree with you, it does not make me right and you wrong. Likewise, it does not make you right and me wrong. What needs to happen is meaningful conversation, because, just maybe, there is third and better way. Do you agree, or disagree?
