

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

"Therefore, I urge you, brothers and sisters, in view of God's mercy, to offer your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and pleasing to God—this is your true and proper worship." (Romans 12:1)

With the changing of the calendar into March, the Christian church will enter into what many have termed the most penitential, reverent, holy, and sacred period of the entire Church Year with the six -week celebration of Lent beginning on March 2, 2022, with the sign of the Cross on the forehead on Ash Wednesday and culminating with the celebration of Christ's resurrection and the "Alleluias" on Easter Sunday.

We, in turn, are called by God, especially during times of repentance and reflection, to be living sacrifices for Him, displaying our devotion in word and deed. Here, Jesus helps us to see the richness of God's mercy in His life, death, and resurrection. Here, we will focus our eyes on the meaning behind God's mercy made visible in Christ. Intentional Interim Minister



On February 13, 2022, Trinity Congregation voted to extend a call to Pastor Roger Schoolcraft, Fayetteville, AR., to serve as the Intentional Interim Minister during our Transition and Call process for our Senior Pastor position.

The Call Documents were presented to Pastor Schoolcraft after the completion of the voters meeting and as of this writing, we have not received the formal response in regard to this IIM call. As we await the decision and response from Pastor Schoolcraft we ask for you to keep him in your prayers and ask for God's guidance as he considers our call.

Florida/Georgia District Convention

The FL/Ga District Convention will be held June 16 thru 18, 2022. Each Congregation will have a Pastoral vote and a Lay Delegate vote during the convention for business matters that are presented. Pastor Blair Clark will be Trinity's Pastoral representative and during the voters meeting, Dennis Esch, Stewardship Chair, was approved to be the voting Lay Delegate for Trinity. Gilbert Dahnke, President, was approved as the alternate, should Dennis be unable to attend the convention. One important item during this year's Convention will be to elect a District President as Rev. Dr. Gregory Walton is term limited and cannot continue in his current capacity.

discussed. The team requested further demographic distance consideration and had suggestions for collaboration tools. It is rewarding to see this talented group work together for Trinity's future.



PRAYER SHAWL MINISTRY-What Is It All About?





shelter and beautify.

The idea of a prayer shawl ministry was established in 1998 in Hartford, Connecticut. Compassion for those in need and a love of knitting combined into a prayerful ministry and spiritual practice which reaches out to those in need of comfort and solace as well as celebration and joy. Many blessings are prayed into every stitch knitted.

The shawl maker begins with prayers and blessings for the recipient of the shawl they are making. These prayers are continued throughout the creation of the shawl. Upon final completion of the shawl, a final blessing is offered by the pastor before the shawl is sent on its way.

The original shawl pattern is a three (3) stitch pattern symbolic of the Father, Son, and Holy Ghost. It also symbolizes the three (3) attributes of God, omniscience, omnipresence, and omnipotence. It is said that the number 3 is used 523 times in Scripture. The 3 stitch seed pattern was also selected as a symbolic planting of peace and healing, love, comfort and hope into the shawl by the shawl maker.

When a fringe is added, knots in the fringe identify individual prayers offered up for that person receiving the shawl. Some knitters save a scrap of yarn from the shawl so they can continue to pray for that particular recipient. More information on the shawl ministry can be found at www.shawlministry.com.

BOARD OF STEWARDSHIP:

Imagine that Herb and Edith are core members of their congregation. They have raised three children

in the faith, as those children attended Lutheran school.

Herb is a retired plumber. Together with Edith they ran their own plumbing business. The Lord blessed them with success. Five years ago they sold the business to someone else. The business maintains its original name and all the clientele passed to the new owner. When they sold it, it netted them \$800,000, in addition to the \$2 million they have saved in their retirement account.

Ten years earlier they had created an estate plan with their attorney. That was before they sold their business. At the time, they had created a \$20,000 gift to ministry as a "tithe" of what would pass through their will. They had not even considered making a gift from the leftovers of their IRA when the Lord calls them home. They put the \$800,000 into an investment account and now it is worth \$1.4 million. At the end of their earthly life they expect there will be over \$2 million of assets remaining, and the investment account and IRA have their children receiving 100% of these assets through beneficiary designation.

In recent months, motivated by their thankfulness for the ministry of their congregation and a desire to see its ministry continue long into the future, they have reconsidered their plan for gifting. They are wondering how to calculate the size of the ministry gift coming from their will. They are also wanting to add to it with disbursements from their investments and IRA. They are wondering which fund from which they should chose and how to fill out the beneficiary designation forms correctly. They want to make a \$500,000 gift to their church for mortgage reduction, property upgrades and mission work. Much to their surprise, each of their children will receive \$500,000 as well.

Overwhelmed by the World's Problems?

When I tell people about persecuted Christians, I often receive a problematic but understandable response: "The world is a big place! I care about poverty, war, natural disaster, human trafficking, lack of education, persecution and many other troubling issues. But I can engage with only a few of these many problems and needs!"

I heartily agree that we are not meant to be continually immersed in the world's problems. However, there is a critical distinction to be made. Persecuted Christians are not a problem to be solved or a need to be met. They are our family, and together with us they are the body and bride of Christ.

The truth we encounter in God's Word is the highest, most important truth. For example, the reality of a believer's death in this world is eclipsed by the greater truth of that believer's eternal life in the presence of the Lord. Similarly, while it is true, as I write this, that I am far from my Christian brothers and sisters in the jungles of Columbia in many ways - distance, language, culture, etc. - there is a greater truth about our relationship: We are eternally united in Christ.

One way Scripture describes this unity is in terms of a family. Each of us is God's child (1 John 3:1), which makes us brothers and sisters. Within God's great family, we are meant to "weep with those who weep" and "rejoice with those who rejoice" (Rom. 12:15). When a Christian anywhere in the world suffers, we share in his or her sorrow because that familial relationship is greater and more enduring than relationships we may have with earthly family members who are not believers. We not only sorrow with our Christian family members but also rejoice with them as they experience victories advancing God's eternal kingdom.

Scripture also descries us as one body. Our Lord gave His body for us - "This is my body, which is for you" (1 Cor. 11:24). We receive His broken body and become for the world the body of Christ, redeemed by His blood. All members are meant to "have the same care for one another," and "if one member suffers, all suffer together; if one member is honored, we rejoice together" (1 Cor. 12:25-26).

A third way Scripture describes our unity is through the church: All of us who trust in Christ are collectively referred to as His bride (Rev. 19:7-8). None of us alone is His bride; it is all of us together.

If we commit ourselves this year to understanding and praying for our persecuted brothers and sisters, it will result in a wellspring of God's love in our hearts towards them. We will be continually encouraged by these eternally significant relationships and inspired by the stories of our persecuted Christian family members as we serve alongside them.

I recently trained my sister Sandy Alice Hass who is visiting from Ohio on how to sew baby washcloths on the surging sewing machine. So far, she has done 84! She has also been a big help in filling the floor pillows. Swing these smaller quilts with such themes as Winnie the Pooh, Raggedy Ann and Andy, fire trucks, etc. is a welcome break from the red white and blue quilts we have been working on since September. We average assembling around 10-12 quilts each week.

A big thank you to all those who read last month's newsletter and responded with donations of some of the items we need on an ongoing basis.

Here is a list of items we need on an ongoing basis:

- ⇒ Sheets (flat or fitted, does not matter if there is a stain, we can use for middles on camp blankets)
- ⇒ Pillowcases
- ⇒ bars of soap (full sized or hotel sized)
- ⇒ washcloths (used or new, inexpensive lighter weight ones are best
- ⇒ filling for our floor pillows (scrap fabric, batting scraps, pillow stuffing)
- ⇒ Macramé cord for drawstrings

If you have any time you can donate on Fridays between the hours of Noon and 3 we would love to have you join us! No Easy Answers: Part 15

Only, live your life in a manner worthy of the gospel of Christ, so that, whether I come and see you or am absent and hear about you, I will know that you are standing firm in one spirit, striving side by side with one mind for the faith of the gospel, (Philippians 1:27)

The sign at the front of the church read, "Read the Bible daily. It is user friendly, and we offer tech support every Sunday morning at 11."

On January 16th of this year, Pastor Blair conducted an educational class on the gifts of the Spirit. After that, he also preached a sermon on the gifts of the Spirit. Both were exceptional. I hope you were there to absorb his teachings. If not, you missed a valuable lesson. I invite you to come and grow in the Word in Bible Class every Sunday morning at 9:15 a.m.!

The lesson taken from the twelfth chapter of First Corinthians, questioned the who, what, and why God, through His Spirit has imparted spiritual gifts to each of His children? The simple answer to that question is found in the Book of Ephesians. It is, "to equip the saints for the work of ministry, for building up the body of Christ, until all of us come to the unity of the faith and of the knowledge of the Son of God, to maturity, to the measure of the full stature of Christ." That would mean, that if you were given a gift from God, and you are not using it for the benefit of others, the church, or the body of Christ, will never reach its full maturity. And that would be a shame.

What is your gift? I do not know. But I do know that if it is not being used, that somewhere and somehow the body is being deprived. It is not living up to the fullness of its potential. At this point in the history of Trinity, we need everyone to, as it were, to present themselves to use their gift. There is an old truth that goes something like this. Twenty percent of the people do eighty percent of the work. And that twenty percent give eighty percent of the funds to run the church. What do you think Trinity would and could do and be if everyone participated and gave their fair share? That concept is known as equal sacrifice but unequal gifts. God has not given us all the same spiritual gifts, and we have not all been blessed with the same financial blessings. But we have all been given the same command.

In the Greek language, a verb can be either one of two tenses. If it is an aorist tense, it carries the notion that means once and for all. If the verb is an imperfect tense, it implies that the action is ongoing, repeated, and continuous. Let me give you an example. In Luke the sixth chapter we read, "give, and it will be given to you. A good measure, pressed down, shaken together, running over, will be put into your lap; for the measure you give will be the measure you get back." When Jesus gave the command to give, do you think it meant only one time, or was it supposed to be on going? I believe you know the answer.

We, as members of the body of Christ, must remember that when we read a command given by Jesus, it is always to be taken as ongoing and endless. Let me give you another example. Jesus said, "love one another as I have loved you." Is that a onetime love, or is it an ongoing love? I will assume you know that answer. But you may say, "you do not know what that person did or said about me." And you would be correct. But consider this. Do you want God to look at you and say, "Look what you did to my Son." I would think not. God and His Son tell us repeatedly that they love us. God forgives our sins, and we forgive the sin of others toward us, not because we are commanded to do so, we do it out of love as Christ loved us.

Paul writes in Philippians, "Finally, beloved, whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is pleasing, whatever is commendable, if there is any excellence and if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things. Keep on doing the things that you have learned and received and heard and seen in me, and the God of peace will be with you." If I do not do what Paul commands, I will never be at peace and in doing so, I will never be the person that God has called me to be.

One last thought, if God does not build my house, the labor I have spent is in vain, and all my time and effort will be wasted. I do not want that, and deep down inside I believe you want the peace of our Father to be with you also.

LOST & FOUND BOX





Music Minister Search: Joan Egeland presented an update to the search for a Music Minister. Our new job postings have not provided any new applicants. The prayers and search continues.

Transition Team: Carolyn Fortin present that the team is working very well. All members of the council should have been contacted for information on what we are doing well and areas of improvements. This information will be used to assist in the Mission and Vision Statements. We are waiting for the new IIM to provide additional direction in our process. The team is also working on the demographics, expanding the information gathering to where all our members are coming from currently.

NEW BUSINESS: *Pastor Roger Schoolcraft Visit Recap*: President Dahnke provided an update on the recent visit and current actions going forward. Pastor Schoolcraft's visit went very well, had the opportunity to meet all leadership, and he indicated that we appear to be more organized than most. The IIM Team approved 5-0, the Council Approved 10-1, and the Voter's Assembly unanimously approved his calling. We have sent his official packet last Sunday via email. He will be in town this Friday, February 18, to pick up the hard copy of the packet and review housing options.

Pastor Blair 2022 Housing Allowance: Chuck Wilt moved MOTION: The housing allowance for Pastor Blair shall be set at \$40,000 for 2022. Carolyn Fortin seconded. Motion carried.

BOARD REPORTS:

Stewardship: (Copy attached) Dennis Esch has had to cancel the Transfer the Blessing seminar due to lack of interest. He will try again in the future modifying the communication strategy. He also requested Boards to take fresh pictures for the website Small Groups (Time/Talents) section. Jill explained that we will need specific types of photos for the site to load. Stewardship will investigate and provide more information.

Trustees: Jeff Bixler reviewed several large expenditures coming up which includes a \$5,000 dishwasher and \$3,400 to replace certain windows in the Fellowship Hall.

Fellowship: (Copy attached.) Patti Paxton reported that the Lenten suppers are being planned, however prices are going through the roof and bids are only good for 1 week. We may need to look at attendance signups for future suppers so that we can manage the food preparation costs. The Free Will collections go to "Other Misc. Income" under the "Operating Fund", but they have not covered the costs.

Elders: (Copy attached.) Chuck Wilt reported that they have created a plan to assist Pastor Blair with monthly visitation of those shut-in, which is currently around 25 individuals. Chuck also reported that they are reviewing more areas to return to normal services practices, including reviewing the costs associated with printing the bulletins, making masks optional for the servers, and review the offering collections process. Pastor Blair provide an option of secured collection boxes in place of the collection plates. Chuck Wilt also reported that we need additional seating for the handicap areas and will be working with the trustees for recommendations. Chuck Wilt requested that Kim Diemand be added to the board replacing Lou Rebeck. Gil Dahnke appointed Kim Diemand to the Board of Elders. Council approved.

Christian Education: No report from board, however Pastor Blair reported that the Bible Studies on Sunday will continue as Pastor-led.

Evangelism: (Copy attached.) Jerry Iseler reported that the board, with the help and guidance from Pastor Blair, will be looking to develop a 6 week session to train a core group of highly committed enthusiastic members to become better "fishers of men". He also expressed that our narthex has not been the friendliest area as of late. We need more smiles to welcome all especially new visitors.

Human Care: Martha Mitchell reported that this group will be having a reorganization meeting.

The next Council meeting will be March 15, 2022 at 1:30 PM in Room 3. Martha moved to adjourn. Dennis seconded. Meeting was adjourned. The group closed with the Lord's Prayer.
