With the Scripture readings and Sermon theme focus for these services, both President Walton on Saturday night and Pastor Schoolcraft on Sunday morning prepared their messages around 'Forget About The Past And Focus On The Future'. Very appropriate for where we are as we are going through the Transition Period and Call Process to fill the full time Senior Pastor Position.

BOARD OF STEWARDSHIP:

After taking her car in to have it repaired, Susan looked at the cost of the parts for that repair and thought that the auto parts business would be a good investment. She did some research and purchased stock about 10 years ago in a mid-sized company that had auto parts stores throughout the nation.

Susan thought that people will always need replacement parts for their autos and other vehicles. She proved to be a good investor, and the stock increased from the \$20,000 she paid to its present value of \$50,000.

Because Susan is now in her late 70s and not getting as much income from her CDs and other investments as she desires, she is exploring ways to increase her income. The stock has increased in value to \$50,000 but pays a dividend between 1% and 2%.

Susan read about a charitable gift annuity. It appeared to her that based on her age she could receive fixed payments of 6.2%. She was quite excited and called her CPA to discuss setting up a gift annuity.

CPA: "Yes, a charitable gift annuity is a contract between you and the charity. I ran your \$50,000 number on the website calculator, and you will receive a 6.2% payout for life. That's \$3,100 each year."

Susan: "That's great! Do I also get any tax savings? I sure could use a deduction this year."

CPA: "There is good news about tax savings. You get a charitable tax deduction of about \$22,000. In addition, around 30% of your annual payment will be tax free."

Susan: "So this is going to increase my income and at the same time reduce my taxes. It sounds like just the right plan. I will contact my church LCMS Foundation Gift Planner Tony Hunt to set things in motion. Ph: 260-222-1291

The Community of Gratitude is an Emergency Food Center serving residents of Marion county in the areas of East Lake Weir, Weirsdale, Ocklawaha and Umatilla. The center is located at 13335 E. Hwy 25, Ocklawaha, directly behind the Ocklawaha Methodist Church on highway 25. The

food center may be reached at 352-288-3499 and is open on Tuesdays and Saturdays from 10 a.m.-12 p.m. and on Thursdays from 1 to 3 p.m. for food distribution to their clients.

As we are all aware, the recent rise in inflation has made a major impact in our quality of life, even more so directly impacting the disadvantaged families in our community. The food needs of the Community of Gratitude has increased by an additional 4-9 families on a weekly average. In addition, at a time of increased needs, the delivery of food stuff from the US government has been reduced by more than 70%. Our congregation has stepped up and increased the donations, as evidenced by the picture of the truck load of food, during the weekend of April 7-10. The Director of the Food Bank, Ms. Marla Teixerra, states that without the support of Trinity, the needs of the recipients would be greatly reduced and many would not receive the help that they need.



HAPPY 175TH BIRTHDAY LUTHERAN CHURCH MISSOURI SYNOD

Only Jesus April 1, 2022 / Letter From the President, LCMS Magazine by Matthew C. Harrison

"And there is salvation in no one else, for there is no other name under heaven given among men by which we must be saved" (Acts 4:12). Celebrating 175 years is important. But it's a rather brief period compared to the 500th anniversary of the Lutheran Reformation. It's less significant still compared to the 2,000-year history of the Lord's Church, and it pales in comparison to the 4,000 years since the call of Abraham and the promise of the Savior given by the Lord to him.

In the past decade of serving the congregations of the Synod, I've learned that I am not that significant, either, especially in the history of the Synod. Nevertheless, God works what He wills despite our insignificance. If a new Lutheran church body began today with 12 congregations, it would be the butt of unending jokes, as was the Missouri Synod in 1847. If it were to claim that its constitution was the restoration of the authority of the inerrant Scriptures, the Lutheran Confessions and authentic New Testament Christianity, it would be ignored, laughed at, and scorned. If it claimed the Bible and Luther's catechism are absolutely true and that there is no other God than the Holy Trinity and no salvation outside of faith in Christ and His blessed cross and resurrection, its founders would be accosted as kooks by contemporaries.

How insignificant were 14 congregations and a handful of pastors 175 years ago? They knew they were numerically insignificant. They knew they were the object of ridicule in a world awash in agnosticism, especially in the church. They lamented the state of their mother churches back in Europe where the Gospel had largely been supplanted by mere morality. Even pastors no longer believed the Word of God.

Like ours, their world was in chaos. Revolutions shook all of Europe in 1848. Atheism was rife among German immigrants to America. A cholera epidemic raged in the U.S. in 1849 and killed thousands. The liberal Germans in St. Louis attacked the Saxons from the moment they stepped off the boat. The LCMS was poor, small, weak, and they knew it. And because they were far flung from Michigan, Indiana, Ohio, Buffalo, and St. Louis, they were lonely. But they were certain of one thing: Luther's Reformation had rediscovered and re-asserted the truth of the free forgiveness of sins in the blessed Gospel of Christ, delivered by the Word and distributed in Baptism and Christ's body and blood in the Sacrament. They came from various backgrounds. Some had been theological liberals (Wilhelm Sihler), many had been pietists (overemphasizing religious feelings as the ground of faith and certainty over the objective teachings of the Bible and catechism). Personal crises had driven a number of them to believe the Bible, read the Lutheran Confessions and confess the old teachings of the Lutheran Church as the teachings of Scripture.

Through Dr. C.F.W. Walther's "The Lutheran" newspaper (*Der Lutheraner*), they discovered each other. They corresponded. They hatched a plan for a Lutheran Synod (*synod* means "together on the same road" in Greek), crafted a constitution (which still survives, mostly word for word in the present LCMS constitution), and officially brought the church body into existence in Chicago on April 26, 1847. The Missouri Saxons brought their log cabin seminary, after Wilhelm Loehe gave the Synod a seminary in Fort Wayne. They embarked on a mission to share the Gospel far and wide and were keenly aware of their divine mandate to "seek and save the lost." They educated pastors and sent them to shepherd the thousands upon thousands of German-speaking immigrants spreading across the wide reaches of America. They planted churches for Germans who had left their homeland for economic promise and had come from weak churches in the old country. In New York and Boston, they met the immigrants as they came off the boats and sent them to German communities served by pastors across the fruited plain. Walther and others spoke English, but they concentrated on German-speaking communities because of the enormous opportunity and volume of work. Eventually, they were only too happy to help found an "English Synod," which became the "English District" of the LCMS (1911).

Just like 175 years ago, war has returned to Europe. We've suffered a global pandemic. The church is in grave decline in the West. Just google "Decline of the Church in the West" for the shocking statistics, particularly in the U.S. The "woke" culture ubiquitous on university campuses all around the world has created a culture of sexual ambiguity. In some ways, the LCMS is doing slightly better than many churches, but we, too, are heavily affected. Easy fixes are mythical. Our children are bombarded from the earliest age with the lies of a morally adrift culture. For 60 years, the sexual revolution has taught that sex is subjective, a personal choice, and one may be one's own creator. Our governments support "sex change" operations even for minors. The abortion of a child as an inconvenient byproduct at odds with one's own self-determination is one of the greatest indicators of the denial of our Creator and His will for His creatures, created male and female. (Read Carl Trueman, *The Rise and Triumph of the Modern Self.*) Apocalyptic times indeed. Come, Lord Jesus!

What's the answer? What's our task? What's our message? Only Jesus. "There is no other name under heaven given among men by which we must be saved" (Acts 4:12).

Today, we are just under 6,000 congregations. Is our constitution antiquated? Not unless the Word of God is antiquated. "The word of the Lord remains forever" (1 Peter 1:25). Today, we have 5,700 active pastors sharing Christ, day in and day out. Today, we have the largest Protestant parochial school system in the U.S. We have thousands of teachers sharing the message with "the least." "Your Creator is the Triune God." "He has made you. You are His." "Only Jesus is your Savior." And "He has redeemed you as His very own creature." We equip our people with Jesus; fortify our mothers and fathers; strengthen homes to love, teach and prepare children for life in this world with its challenges and blessings; shore up our men to be men in God and our women to be holy women of Christ.

Today, we face the hatred and ridicule of the world, a world in chaos. Our fathers and mothers in the faith faced the same. Today, we face the same threat of loneliness and isolation they did. Whether the loneliest pastor and tiniest congregation in the farthest reaches of the earth or the president of the Synod, we are terribly insignificant. Imagine those 14 lonely, insignificant congregations in 1847. What a difference it made for them to be joined in faith and love in the Lutheran confession.

Today, we face very similar challenges. The decline of Christianity in the West presents us with the greatest challenge in the modern history of the church. With Jesus, and only Jesus, we shall go forth nevertheless: "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you. And behold, I am with you always, to the end of the age" (Matt. 28:19–20). "Let us hold fast the confession of our hope without wavering, for he who promised is faithful" (Heb. 10:23).

Who we are — a 175-year-old church body — is important, but it pales in comparison to the history of the church. But what we do — preaching and pointing to Jesus for 175 years — is quite significant indeed. It has eternal consequences. If 175 years is an accomplishment, it's Christ's accomplishment. Come what may, the next 175 years are in the hands of Jesus, only Jesus, and so are we.—Pastor Harrison

While Julia Mack attended the monthly meeting of Friends of SOZO she had the opportunity to speak with Pastor Dave who ministers to the SOZO kids. She asked him about the need of Camp blankets. He told her how those simple home sewn blankets are treasured by the camp attendees. She was told there are about 300 kids who attend this camp. Our next efforts will be to put together as many camp blankets as we can. Julia Mack has coordinated some volunteers in her Del Webb Community to help with this project and is opening up her house to have sewing sessions on Wednesday mornings. If you are a Del Webber and would like to help please contact her. We will be working on this project at our regular Friday meetings as well. At our April 15th meeting we had a great time matching up fronts and backs for the Camp Blanket project.

The last meeting of the Sewing Angels will be May 6th. After that co leader Pam Bixler will be sending out emails about meetings during the summer at her discretion.

Here is a list of things we need for our ministry: military fabric specific to each branch of the service; sew on Velcro for port pillows (any color); macramé cord or crocheted drawstrings (20"-24") for personal care and laundry bags; sheets, flat or fitted, for quilt backs; and embroidery floss (any color, but especially black, white, red, or navy) for tying quilts and blankets.

Cornerstone SALUTES!

Cornerstone Hospice celebrates the service of our veteran patients through our 'Cornerstone Salutes' Program. A tailor-made Pinning Ceremony is conducted for our veteran patients, and their family: each veteran is presented with a special pin and a Certificate of Appreciation. The Cornerstone SALUTES! Volunteer has the responsibility to provide volunteer services to Cornerstone Hospice Veteran patients. Non-Veterans may be involved through the Veteran's History Project, recording stories of our Veteran's experiences to submit to the Library of Congress in Washington, D.C. Additional training is required.

Life Enrichment

Life Enrichment Volunteers encompass a wide variety of services to our patients which enhance patient and family quality of life. Life Enrichment activities range from pet therapy, patient haircuts, yard work and lawn care. Volunteers may also help by assisting as barbers, beauticians or by doing yard work or lawn care.

Long Term Care

Long Term Care Volunteers not only visit patients in nursing facilities, assisted living facilities, and hospitals, but they also visit these facilities as ambassadors for Cornerstone Hospice. LTC Volunteers bring cheer, information, and comfort to the staff and patients. They can ensure the environment is tidy and welcoming, offer refreshments, run errands, and bring smiles and hugs to everyone in the facility!

Patient/Family Support

Patient/Family Support Volunteers have the responsibility to provide volunteer services to patients, caregivers, and families through a variety of activities. These services may take place in the patient home, long-term care facility, or Cornerstone Hospice House.

Pet Peace of Mind

Pet Peace of Mind Volunteers assist Cornerstone Hospice patients with their pets and provide needed care and attention, and also provide simple comfort measures after receiving permission from the owner. Pet Peace of Mind is designed to help keep our patients and their pets together for as long as possible, and trained volunteers can assist by walking dogs, providing waste management, transporting pets to veterinary appointments or to visit their owner in a facility. Some volunteers also staff our Pet Peace of Mind display at community-based pet events or visit pet-related businesses to let others in the pet community know about this program. Additional training is required.

Sewing/Crafting

Sewing/Crafting Volunteers will create comfort items for patients and/or family members through creative abilities including sewing, knitting, or crocheting. Bear in Mind Volunteers create personalized keepsake bears out of 'memory material'. Each bear is unique and custom made with the individual patient in mind, and constructed completely out of memory material (garments, ties, accessories) provided by the family for the specific bear. Additionally, Volunteers and community members can also sew, knit or crochet non-personalized items such as fidget blankets, blankets, and afghans for our patients. Volunteers are encouraged to secure donated materials for these projects.

Spiritual Care

The Spiritual Care Volunteer, under guidance of the hospice Chaplain, has responsibility to provide spiritual support for patients and families at Cornerstone Hospice. Additional training is required.

Transportation

Transportation Volunteers provide transportation support to patients, caregivers, and families on an as needed basis. Volunteers may transport a patient to a doctor's appointment or other medical treatment; pickup and deliver prescriptions; or act as couriers for crucial medical records. This is a personal service which can be beneficial to the volunteer as well as the patient. There is direct patient contact and contact with the professional care community. Liability insurance of \$300,000 or more is required.

TST Nurse

The TST Nurse Volunteer has responsibility to assist with the administration, reading and recording of results of the Tuberculin Skin Test (TST) for new volunteers in conjunction with Volunteer Training. Current Florida RN license and additional training required.

Vigil

The Vigil Care Volunteer has the responsibility to sit quietly with the dying patient and to provide simple comfort measures. These services may take place in the patient home, long term care facility, or Cornerstone Hospice House. Additional training is required.

Recipe for Gary's Chicken

Ingredients:

2 lb chicken tenders
2 tubes of Ritz crackers
¼ tsp salt
1/8 tsp pepper
½ cup whole milk
3 cups cheddar cheese, grated
1 tsp dried parsley

Sauce:

1 can cream of chicken soup2 TBSP sour cream2 TBSP butter





Directions:

- 1. Crush crackers. Pour the milk, cheese, and cracker crumbs into separate small pans. Toss the salt and pepper into the cracker crumbs and stir the mixture around to combine. Dip each piece of chicken into the milk and then the cheese. Press the cheese into the chicken with your fingers. Then press the cheesy-coated chicken into the cracker crumbs and press it in.
- 2. Spray a 9x13 pan with cooking spray and lay the chicken inside the pan. Sprinkle the dried parsley over the chicken. Cover the pan with foil and bake at 400 degrees for 35 minutes. (for a convection oven use 350 degrees) Remove the foil, bake for an additional 10-15 minutes, or until the edges of the chicken are golden brown and crispy.
- 3. In a medium sized sauce pan combine the cream of chicken soup, sour cream and butter with a whisk. Stir it over medium high heat until the sauce is nice and hot. Serve over the chicken.
